Having completed his matric in 2016, majoring in Mechanical Engineering, Mathematics, Physical Science and Engineering Graphics and Design (EGD), Nortje went on to pursue a fitting and turning apprenticeship at HG Molenaar in Paarl, funded by the merSETA. He completed the training and is now permanently employed.

The ambitious Nortje explains how his passion for working with hands led him to this career path. He enjoys his work, which challenges him to think "out of the box", analyse and find solutions for any problems he may encounter.

"My work entails building packaging and labelling machinery from scratch. Once the building process is complete, I do installation and perform maintenance on the machines when required. This is exciting but also challenging, which makes me look forward to doing it every day because it gives me an opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills I acquired through my apprenticeship," says Nortje.

He explains that it was through this apprenticeship that he was able to put his theoretical learning into practice. This is where he learnt the importance of skills transfer and made it a point to take note of every detail while observing how his

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colleagues and mentors executed their work.

"I closely watched and listened to my superiors and other colleagues, ensured that I learned from them and practised what I learnt so that I could become knowledgeable. If it was not for the mentorship of the older generation of artisans I worked with, I would not be where I am today," he says.
